Synopsis and History



Putting It Together is a musical revue featuring songs by Stephen Sondheim. The show takes place at a party thrown by an older couple facing marital troubles, with guests including a younger couple struggling with their feelings and desires and a commentator who oversees and influences the action. While conflicts occur, all is reconciled before dawn.

Theatre Producer, Cameron Mackintosh invited Stephen Sondheim to create a brand-new revue of some of his notable songs. The show was first staged in 1992 in Oxford, England, in a production directed by Julia McKenzie.

The show moved to New York, where it was produced by the Manhattan Theatre Club at the City Center Theatre. In 1998, a new version premiered in Los Angeles with a cast featuring Carol Burnett, George Hearn, John Barrowman, Ruthie Henshall, and Bronson Pinchot. This new production transferred to Broadway, where it began previews at the Ethel Barrymore Theatre on October 30, 1999. *Putting It Together* officially opened on November 21, 1999.



Putting It Together ran on Broadway for 22 previews and 101 regular performances before closing on February 20, 2000. The musical revue continues to be performed around the world!

Musical Revue vs Book Musical

Putting It Together is considered a "Musical Revue" but how is that different from a traditional "Book musical?"

Book Musical: A book musical is normally made up of three major elements; music, lyrics, and script (book). In most cases, the script or story is created first, and then the score (music and lyrics) is created afterward as a way of developing the characters and furthering the narrative. A book musical is defined as a performance where musical numbers and dances are fully integrated into a proper narrative with defined dramatic goals.


Musical Revue: A revue is a type of musical theatre entertainment which loosely combines singing, dancing, music, and sometimes sketches by a common theme. Although a revue can have a sketch of a storyline, this is not always typical and any story is usually secondary to the individual pieces and performances within the revue. Revues may be staged by particular composers or performers to showcase their own work.

Because *Putting It Together* is show created by combining Stephen Sondheim songs already written for other musicals into a loosely based evening built around the theme of relationships, the show is considered a "Musical Revue."

Meet Composer & Lyricist Stephen Sondheim

Stephen Joshua Sondheim is widely recognized as one of the greatest musical theater composers of the twentieth century. How much do you know about the composer and lyricist?



- Stephen Joshua Sondheim was born on March 22, 1930 in New York City.
- Sondheim has traced his passion for musical theater back to a
 production of Very Warm for May which he saw on Broadway at
 the age of nine. He recalls, "The curtain went up and revealed a
 piano. A butler took a duster and brushed it up, tinkling the
 keys. I thought it was thrilling."
- At age 10, after his parents divorced, Stephen befriended James Hammerstein who was the son of Oscar Hammerstein II (American lyricist, known for his collaboration with Richard Rodgers on shows such as Oklahoma and The King and I). Sondheim found a new father figure in Oscar Hammerstein, who brought Sondheim with his family to see Broadway shows and became both Sondheim's writing teacher and inspiration.



- He studied piano and organ, and at age 15 he wrote a musical while attending George School in Bucks County, Pennsylvania.
- In 1957, Sondheim was asked to write the lyrics for a new musical re-working of Romeo and Juliet, which would become West Side Story. It was his artistic introduction to the Broadway stage.
 Sondheim worked alongside composer Leonard Bernstein to write the show's lyrics despite their vastly different approaches.
- 1962's A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum was the first show for which Sondheim wrote both music and lyrics. The musical won many Tonys, including Best Musical, but Sondheim's score was not well received. This was a recurring theme for many of Sondheim's musicals: he received consistent criticism that his lyrics were too dark, his tunes were not "hummable," and the subject matter "wrong" for a musical. Sondheim's response to those who thought his work inaccessible was "what I write has to be listened to more than once."
- Sondheim was an avid fan of games and puzzles. In 1968 and 1969, he published a series of cryptic crossword puzzles in *New York Magazine*. In 1987, *Time Magazine* called his love of puzzle-making "legendary in theater circles."

In 2010, in celebration of his 80th birthday, the Henry Miller's
 Theatre on Broadway in New York City was renamed the Stephen
 Sondheim Theatre. Stephen Sondheim has a theatre named for him both on Broadway and in the West End of London.

Throughout his long and prolific career he won an Academy Award, eight Tony Awards, including a Lifetime Achievement in the Theatre award, eight Grammy Awards, seven Drama Desk Awards, a Pulitzer Prize, and six Laurence Olivier Awards. He was also honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Kennedy Center and was given the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2014.





Sondheim's unconventionality greatly changed the face of American theater. "Does it ever occur to me that I am developing any new kind of musical? ... Never!"

Despite the negligible commercial success of his musicals, Sondheim's music is widely celebrated and many of his songs have become standards of musical theater and jazz. The complexity of both his music and lyrics and the unique way he captures the world of his musical through song make his works stand out from the crowd.

Stephen Sondheim died November 26, 2021 at age 91.


Which Came First: Lyrics or Music?

When he wrote, Sondheim says, he didn't necessarily always write the lyrics first or the music first; the process depended on what popped into his head.

"I will improvise or think of various melodic ideas and sometimes chord sequences. ... At the same time, I'm also jotting down any lyric," he says. "But I never go far without bringing the other one in, because you can paint yourself into a corner if you write a whole tune or even half a tune with no idea what you're going to say in it."

And when he needed to create a rhyme, Sondheim clarified that it was crucial to know what he wanted to say beforehand.

"Know what you want to say and then how you want to phrase what you want to say...as the music develops, you'll start to improvise a rhyme scheme or to sense a rhyme scheme. And then you'll say 'All right, I've got this line that ends with "day" and I want to say "She loves him,' " and then you go through the rhyming dictionary. But there's so many rhymes for 'day.'... You make a list of rhymes that are in some way relevant, and then you use them."

"Sooner or Later," "Back in Business," "Live Alone and Like It," and "More," are all Sondheim songs highlighted in this 1990 movie.



This a fast-paced farce combining the ancient comedies of Plautus with a vaudevillian delivery. Pseudolus schemes to win the heart of the beautiful virgin, Phelia, for his young master, Hero. In exchange, Hero will grant Pseudolus his freedom once and for all. However, chaos ensues with hair-brained schemes, cases of mistaken identity, slamming doors, and convoluted plot twists. Some song favorites include "Lovely" and "Everybody Ought to Have a Maid."





Into the Woods






Anyone Can Whistle




Merrily We Roll Along

He ultimately realizes that he has left himself with nothing of any value. 
